Course Description:

This course is an extensive study of the civics, politics, and the inner workings of the United States government. This course intends to introduce you to your government and help you become better acquainted with its workings. Historical and philosophical underpinnings are examined throughout the course. This is an overview of the structures, processes, and interactions involved in decision making at the national, state, and local levels in this republic.

Course Goals/Competencies

- 1. Explain the origins, and the purpose of government.
- 2. Evaluate what power is and how it relates to politics.
- 3. Appraise the historical and philosophical underpinnings of the American Constitution.
- 4. Identify the basic principles of the Constitution and Bill of Rights.
- 5. Evaluate the concept of Federalism.
- 6. Characterize the structure and function of the federal government, including details particular to each branch.

- 7. Analyze the American campaign and the election process.
- 8. Explain the key events and concepts in the development and functioning of the two party system.
- 9. Analyze the historical and contemporary struggles for civil liberties and civil rights.

Course Outcomes

- Students will increase their knowledge of the structure and functioning of the American Political System.
- Students will increase written communication skills.
- Students will increase oral communication skills.
- Students will become better readers and critical thinkers.
- Students will increase their interpersonal, organizational, and time management skills.

Course Requirements:

- Lectures, assigned readings, and note taking are the primary learning tools.
- Many small group works and in-class activities and dynamics related to issues and current events.
- One main overarching group project.
- Students are expected to be aware, keep on the news, and do independent research on current political issues/events.
- Frequent regular testing (both objective and essay) is used to evaluate learning.
- Weekly homework assures student preparation.
- Frequent research and essay projects will foster increased written communication skills.

Graded Activities:

- Ten Article reflections @ 20 points each.
- Nine Section exams @ 50 points each.
- Two research essay projects @ 30 points each.
- Several group work activities, three of which will be graded @ 50 points each.
- Homework assignment as assigned
- One semester group project @ 100 points.
- One Inclusive/Comprehensive essay Final Exam @ 100 points
