- Segment and blend phonemes and syllables in English words.
- Identify and discriminate between English phonemes.
- Use best practices to teach new word study activities to your students.

Define and give examples of alphabetic awareness, orthotactic and orthographic patterns and rules, open and closed syllables, r-controlled vowels, morphemes, inflectional and derivational affixes.
